

As a parent, you are probably continually telling your teenager they need to get more sleep.

Here's something you might not know. It is normal for teenagers to resist going to bed early and biology is the cause.

Your body clock which is in charge of your sleep patterns, gets reset during teenage years.

This results in melatonin (the sleep hormone) being released later at night for teenagers than adults.

Hold on students, this does not mean it's okay to stay up late into the night!



Sleepy Tips

Here's some tips for teaching your body clock who's boss and getting a healthy amount of sleep at night.

Tip 1:

Develop a schedule around what time you go to bed and wake up every day, even weekends!

Tip 2:

Make sure your room is very dark, quiet and uncluttered

Tip 3:

Avoid drinking coffee, black or green tea, energy drinks and soft drinks in the evening

Tip 4:

Download F.Lux filter onto your electronic devices to reduce visual stimulation when you use your phone/laptop in the evening

Sleep is vital to your physical, psychological and social well-being.

Not getting enough sleep can lead to:

- decreased concentration
- memory impairment
- reduced academic and sporting performance
- mood instability and negative thoughts
- feeling 'off' throughout the day

So here's the golden rule!

Teenagers need between 8 to 11 hours of sleep!



Tip 5:

Stop watching TV and using your phone at least an hour before bed

Tip 6:

Do something relaxing before bed like taking a shower, reading, meditating, listening to a sleep story or thinking about how grateful you are for your family, friends and pizza

Tip 7:

Be sure to turn off your phone or keep it in another room while you sleep to avoid disruptions and unnecessary drama! I know this feels almost impossible and requires great discipline, but you'll be so much better off for it!

Starting the day with a Positive: Morning Homeroom.

Mornings at Avila are alive with the buzzing sounds emerging from every homeroom. School has begun!

Each day at Avila College starts with students meeting in their assigned homerooms with their homeroom teacher. This fifteen minute block, from 8.35 to 8.50 am, at the beginning of their working day, serves a variety of important purposes in the students' life at the College.

Research has shown that for a modern teenager to have robust mental health they must feel a connection to something bigger than themselves. For Avila College students, this is often what they find as a member of a homeroom. It is a time when our students interact with their peers, celebrate special occasions, discuss current affairs, major events in their year level and social issues that concern them.

Having an adult mentor or advocate in the school is a great advantage for our students and this role is fulfilled by their homeroom teacher. A strong connection with this person is established in homeroom each morning, over the course of the year. It is an important point of contact with a trusted adult in their lives. Homerooms, in the company of their teachers, often establish their own 'personality', which can even extend to their own jokes. This all adds to a student's sense of belonging.



Often it is during homeroom that important information is distributed to students about their academic program. This information and that pertaining to extra-curricula activities is communicated when the Class Captains read the Student Messages to the class. This fifteen minute period of the day also allows each student to organise their materials. It gives them time to settle and establish focus.

Homeroom looks different for different year levels throughout the school. In Year 7 Gold, for example, you may see students discussing ways in which to make their homeroom really feel like home. Their decoration committee is a force to be reckoned with! At the other end of the school, the Year 12 Leaders have made Wednesday homeroom a time for the year level to bond. This bond will prove ever more important as they move towards the final stage of their school journey.

Every morning homeroom begins with a prayer. This communal prayer is a time for the sharing of a common faith and an all-important moment in the students' busy day when they can engage in conversation with God.

Who could believe that so much could happen in that short period of fifteen minutes!



We were fortunate to attend a human rights conference run by the Monash University Castan Centre. The conference consisted of speakers and panels of human rights activists tackling a variety of issues both in Australia and on an international scale.

This was an amazing opportunity to learn about human rights issues in our society and to explore the ways that these issues can be tackled.

Listening to human rights lawyers, artists, professors, and directors of human rights advocacy groups gave us a chance to learn about:

- work in the Australian legal sector
- · the passion of those working in human rights
- the state of human rights in Australia and the world.

A highlight of the conference was the panel on refugees in Australia, in which the speakers discussed the importance of working with refugees on the issues they face within Australia and offshore - Australia's infamous treatment of refugees from the perspective of the world stage.

It was more than informative - it was very, very moving. It gave us more of an understanding of the lives of refugees and the failings in Australia's treatment of these most vulnerable people.

We were lucky enough to have further discussions with Associate Professor Kate Galloway who delivered a very engaging and insightful presentation about data and the importance of privacy.

Being able to attend this conference was an amazing learning opportunity, it gave us a chance to better understand human rights issues in our society and how we can help resolve these to make a positive change.
