HOW TO CONSTRUCT YOUR BIBLIOGRAPHY:

- A bibliography is a list of all the resources you have used
- It is organised alphabetically by the first letter of each entry
- This is usually the first letter of the author's surname but not always see examples below

Books with an Author:

MacDonald, Fiona. Middle Ages. Oxford: Raintree, 2005.

Murrell, Deborah. Knight. London: QED Publishing, 2009.

• These are your standard examples - Author, Title, Publication information.

Book without an Author:

<u>Living in the Middle Ages</u>. Edited by Dianne Zarlengo. SanDiedo: Greenhaven Press, 2004.

• No author so you move the Title to the first spot and include the name of the editor if you can find one listed.

Textbook:

Easton, Mark et.al. <u>Humanities : Victorian Curriculum 8</u>. Sth. Melbourne, Vic. : Oxford University Press, 2016.

• Textbooks often have lots of authors. You will probably be using the online version of this on ReadCloud but it's just a pdf version and exactly the same as the hardcopy book.

Website:

BBC (2021) <u>Life in Medieval England</u> "Medieval England 1250-1500" https://www.bbc.co.uk/bitesize/guides/zpftdmn/revision/3 Accessed 12 Nov. 2021.

 The author of the website can be a person or an organisation. We include the title of the article we have used and underline it, the name of the website it comes from in inverted commas and the URL of the actual article.

World Book Online:
